Chelsea Albucher, Sustainability Officer, Office of Sustainability, City of Newark

Chelsea Albucher is an environmental scientist and urban planner with over fifteen years of experience related to sustainable urban development. As Sustainability Officer for the City of Newark, NJ, she is working closely with Mayor Cory Booker to develop policy, programs and partnerships to green Newark's economy, its neighborhoods, and its infrastructure. As a Brownfields Project Manager with USEPA, she spent a decade working closely with localities during the formative stages of smart growth programs. She has facilitated redevelopment that resulted in new open space, waterfront access, affordable housing and commercial development. She also played a key role developing USEPA's Brownfields Job Training program that saw people from non-traditional educational backgrounds employed in living wage green jobs. As USEPA's Inter-Agency Work Group Coordinator, she brought agencies into communities to provide strategic assistance and develop collaborative approaches. This leveraged funding for over 60 localities and enhanced coordination amongst 26 federal and state agencies. She began her career working for Congresswoman Bella Abzug.

Leon K. Baptiste, Principal, LB Electric Co., LLC.

Leon Baptiste opened EDC II in Newark in 1999. The company provides electrical systems, testing, solar (Photovoltaic), designs and installation for major organization, including, but not limited to: commercial and industrial, school, hospitals and government agencies. Baptiste holds a BEE Degree from New Jersey Institute of Technology. A former Vice President, 18 years with Nordling, Dean Electric Co., Inc., Chatham, NJ. His certifications include: Business Registration; Electrical Business Permit; Electrical Contractor; Public works; MBE / SBE – NJ Commerce; Port Authority of New York & New Jersey MBE / SBE; New Jersey Transit DBE; RWE Schott Solar Systems and Uni-Solar Systems.

Eva Bonime, Executive Director, NJ Working Families Alliance, Coordinator, Better Choices Budget Campaign

Eva Bonime is the Executive Director of the New Jersey Working Families Alliance, a 2-year-old organization formed by community, labor and environmental groups. Prior to joining the NJWFA, Eva spent six years as an organizer and Special Projects Director for the Working Families Party, a community- and labor-based third party that uses fusion voting laws to elect progressive candidates and advance issues. While at the Working Families Party, Eva directed the successful campaign to raise New York's minimum wage in 2004. Eva got her start in public policy as a legislative intern for a New Jersey State Assemblymember and as an Americorps volunteer at the Passaic County Legal Aid Society. Eva received her B.A. in Political Science at Yale University.

Patricia Castellanos, Project Director, Ports Campaign for the Los Angeles Alliance for a New Economy

Patricia is the project director at the Los Angeles Alliance for a New Economy (LAANE), a nationally recognized leader in the effort to create better jobs and healthier communities. Through her work with LAANE, she has played a key role in building the Coalition for Clean and Safe Ports, a broad alliance of environmental, community, public health, religious and labor organizations. The Coalition supports the comprehensive plan put forward by the Ports of L.A. and Long Beach to address the problems of pollution, disease and poverty caused by the chaotic port trucking system. Ms. Castellanos served in the administration of Los Angeles Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa in the capacity of Harbor Area Director. She also worked as policy and education training director for SCOPE.

Ed Clerico, Professional Engineer and Director, Alliance Environmental, LLC

Ed is a licensed Professional Engineer and licensed wastewater operator in NY, NJ and PA and is an accredited LEED Accredited Professional. He holds BS and MS degrees from Rutgers University in Bio-Ag Engineering. Ed was the founder and president of Applied Water Management, Inc. before holding executive roles with American Water as Technical Development Director and VP Strategy. Presently he operates his own consulting business known as Alliance Environmental that focuses on Sustainable Infrastructure and Green Building Concepts.

The Honorable Joe Fiordaliso, Commissioner, NJ Board of Public Utilities

Born and raised in the Ironbound section of Newark, Commissioner Fiordaliso received a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Business Education from Montclair State University, and completed graduate and management courses at Montclair State University, Rutgers University, and American College. Commissioner Fiordaliso has served as the Director of Government Relations for the Saint Barnabas Health Care System, an educator at Vailsburg High School and Bloomfield High School, adjunct professor of Accounting at County College of Morris, and councilman in Livingston Township. Mr. Fiordaliso also served as the Director of Planning and Economic Development, Mayor of Livingston Township, District Director for Senate President Richard Codey, and Deputy Chief of Staff for Governor Codey. He currently serves on the Essex County Democratic Executive Committee and the Board of Trustees of both Essex County College & West Essex YMCA. In 2005, Joe was nominated by Governor Richard Codey and confirmed by the Senate, to be a Commissioner on the Board of Public Utilities, where he currently serves.

Mary Forsberg, Interim President, NJ Policy Perspective

Mary is the Interim President and Research Director of the New Jersey Policy Perspective, a 12-year-old non profit, non partisan research and educational organization whose mission is to promote broad, vigorous debate about important issues facing the people of New Jersey. Mary has written extensively about taxes and other budget-related topics. Prior to joining NJPP, Mary worked for 14 years at the Office of Legislative Services doing budget and tax research. She has Masters degrees in Asian history from the University of Pennsylvania and in public finance from the Humphrey Institute at the University of Minnesota.

Toni Griffin, Director, Division of City Planning in Newark

Toni L. Griffin has built a twenty-year career in both the public and private sectors, combining the practice of architecture and urban design with the execution of innovative, large-scale, mixed-use urban redevelopment projects and citywide and neighborhood planning strategies. Prior to her appointment as the Director of Community Development for the City of Newark, Ms. Griffin served as Vice President and Director of Design for the Anacostia Waterfront Corporation in Washington DC; Deputy Director for Revitalization Planning and Neighborhood Planning in the D.C. Office of Planning, Vice President for Planning & Tourism Development for the Upper Manhattan Empowerment Zone Development Corporation in New York City, architect and Associate Partner with Skidmore, Owings & Merrill LLP in Chicago. Ms. Griffin received a Bachelor's of Architecture from the University of Notre Dame and a yearlong appointment as a Loeb Fellow at the Harvard University Graduate School of Design. Ms. Griffin is also currently a Visiting Design Critic at the Harvard Graduate School of Design, teaching the core urban planning studio and a course on neighborhood planning and development.

Mike Gordon, Esq., Gordon and Gordon

At Gordon and Gordon, Michael Gordon has helped to create one of the most active and successful plaintiffs environmental law firms in the State of New Jersey. Mr. Gordon has been retained by the State of New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection to represent the State of New Jersey to effectuate the cleanup of the Passaic River. He also has a long and successful history in the use of the Citizen Suit and Environmental Rights Act. He served as local counsel of the Public Interest Research Group and Friends of the Earth in prosecuting the first waive of successful Clean Water Act Citizen Suit litigation. Michael Gordon has also served on the Board of the New Jersey Environmental Federation, the state's Emergency Solid Waste Assessment Task Force, Environmental Department Transition team on the Enforcement Subcommittee, and Governor McGreevey's Sprawl Summit.

Dena Mottola-Jaborska, Executive Director, Environment New Jersey

Dena Mottola Jaborska was born in Hoboken and grew up in Old Bridge, New Jersey. She is a 1993 graduate of Cornell University and worked as a community organizer and health care consumer advocate in Illinois prior to joining staff at NJPIRG in 2000. Dena became Executive Director of NJPIRG in 2003, and has led Environment New Jersey since 2006, a statewide citizen-based environment advocacy organization. During her career, Dena has been involved in many successful advocacy campaigns to promote clean energy, cleaner air, clean water and open space preservation, as well as efforts to protect consumers from energy rate hikes and identity theft, just to name a few. Dena is married and resides with her husband and daughter in the Island neighborhood of Trenton.

Roy Jones, Co-Chair and Coordinator, South Jersey Environmental Justice Alliance

Roy Jones coordinates environmental justice in the seven counties in South Jersey, which includes urban, rural & suburban counties. Mr. Jones has a bachelor from Rutgers University, a M.A. from Glassboro State College/Rowan University, a M.S. in business/community economic development from New Hampshire College, and doctoral work from Temple University. Mr. Jones has an extensive civil rights/social and environmental justice background, spanning nearly 40 years. He began his environmental justice work in 1980, when he made a decision to run for Mayor and include in his platform an environmental justice platform. Mr. Jones was awarded the 2003 New Jersey Environmental Federation Outstanding Achievement Award and served as a U.S. Department Housing Urban Development Fellow at New Hampshire College. He also is a founding member of the New Jersey Environmental Justice Alliance. In addition, Mr. Jones is a Senior Environmental Fellow. And just recently, Mr. Jones was appointed in 2009 to the National Children's Environmental Caucus. This appointment will allow him to further expand his work begun in New Jersey around the impact of environmental conditions in schools on children.

Christine LeMieux, National Energy Coordinator, Clean Water Action

Christine LeMieux joined Clean Water Action in October 2008 and currently serves as the Global Warming and Energy Programs Coordinator. Christine works with policy makers, organizations, and other key allies to promote Clean Water Action's agenda in Congress and with other constituencies. She is responsible for mobilizing members around policy initiatives, monitoring federal energy and global warming policy, developing outreach materials, and she coordinates Clean Water grassroots campaigns among national and state staff. Prior to Clean Water Action, Christine worked in the International Affiliate Program at Edison Electric Institute and interned for Reluminati, a solar power distributed generation company located in DC.

Mark Mauriello, Commissioner, New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (NJDEP)

Before his nomination as Commissioner, Mauriello served as the NJDEP's Assistant Commissioner for Land Use Management. Mauriello represents Governor Corzine on the Delaware River Basin Commission, a partnership among New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Delaware and the federal government to manage the resources of the Delaware River Basin. He has served on many committees and working groups, including the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Coastal Elevation and Sea Level Rise Advisory Committee, the NJDEP's Global Climate Working Group, the New Jersey Hazard Mitigation Team, and the New Jersey Sea Grant's Coastal Processes Advisory Committee. Born and raised in Jersey City, Mauriello resides in Hamilton Township, Mercer County, with his wife Joanne, and sons Todd and Daniel.

Peter Montague, PhD, Executive Director, Environmental Research Foundation

Peter Montague's organization provides community groups with technical information (in an understandable form) about human health and the environment. In recent years, he work has focused on good decision-making using the precautionary principle. He is active in the New Jersey Environmental Justice Alliance. Dr. Montague has co-authored two books on toxic heavy metals in the natural environment. He served as project administrator of the Hazardous Waste Research Program in the School of Engineering/Applied Science at Princeton University. He was employed in the computer field as Manager of Distributed Computing in the Office of Computing and Information Technology at Princeton University, as well as senior research analyst in the Toxics Reduction Campaign for Greenpeace USA.

Robert Morse, Pittsgrove Township Volunteer

Robert Morse is 52 years old, has been married to his wife Pat for 22 years, and has three children ages 11, 16, and 21. Robert has an Associate Degree in Science and has worked at the Valero Energy Analytical Laboratory for the past 18 years as an Advanced Laboratory Technician. Robert has a background in wastewater testing and NJDEP rules and regulations. One of the more important functions of his profession is to make sure the water the refinery puts back in the Delaware River is cleaner than when they take it out. He is a past member of the Pittsgrove Township Environmental Commission. For the past six years, he has been studying and commenting on the environment and its constraints at the local level. Robert also received one of this year's environmental achievement awards from NJ Environmental Federation for his success in helping Pittsgrove Township pass a Pesticide Free Zone resolution at Deer Pen Park in 2008.

Jeff Nash, Vice Chair, Delaware River Port Authority and Camden County Freeholder

Jeff Nash was born and raised in Brooklyn, NY. Jeff completed a degree in Political Science at George Washington University, then pursued a career in law, graduating from the Hofstra University School of Law. Jeff is now a senior partner at Cozen O'Connor, a prestigious Philadelphia firm, specializing in civil litigation. Jeff has also served on the Cherry Hill Council, seven-member Camden County Board of Chosen Freeholders, and as the Camden County Freeholder Director. As Freeholder Director, Jeff led a bold initiative to secure and preserve nearly 1,000 acres of open space and farmland. In 2002, he was appointed as Vice Chairman of the Delaware River Port Authority of Pennsylvania and New Jersey, a bi-state regional transportation and economic development agency with a special focus on the industrial and commercial revitalization of the Philadelphia-Camden Waterfront.

Paul Schwartz, National Policy Coordinator, Clean Water Action

Paul Schwartz is Clean Water Action's National Policy Coordinator and Clean Water Fund's Water Policy Director. Schwartz's areas of focus include: drinking water standard's setting and source protection, wet weather issues, and water infrastructure finance. Schwartz sits on the steering committees of both the Campaign for Safe and Affordable Drinking Water and is a co-chair of the Clean Water Network's Wet Weather/Funding Workgroup.

Nicky Sheats, Esq., PhD, Director, Center for the Urban Environment at the John S. Watson Institute for Public Policy

Sheats provides ongoing support for New Jersey's environmental justice community. In 2003, he became a founding member of the New Jersey Environmental Justice Alliance, the only statewide environmental organization that focuses solely on environmental justice issues. Sheats received his Ph.D. from the Department of Earth and Planetary Sciences at Harvard University in 2000. After graduating, he worked for Environmental Defense as a science and law fellow, at The College of New Jersey as a visiting scholar and at the Earth Institute of Columbia University as a post-doctoral fellow. Sheats also attended Harvard Law School. He worked as a public interest attorney and served as a law clerk for the Chief Judge of the District of Columbia Court of Appeals (the equivalent of a state supreme court), a landlord-tenant and housing attorney at Camden Regional Legal Services, a public defender in New Brunswick, NJ, and a legal instructor at a community legal education and college preparatory program in Harlem.

Jeff Tittel, Director, Sierra Club-New Jersey Chapter

For the past 11 years, Jeff has lead the club's legislative and outreach efforts in Trenton and around the state. His most recent policy accomplishments include passing the Clean Car Act, the Highlands Act, the Global Warming Response Act, and an unprecedented 300 foot buffer for Category 1 streams. Membership at the Sierra Club has grown with his legislative successes; in 1998 the Sierra Club had 13,000 members and currently the membership is 22,000. Among many other awards, in 2008 New Jersey Monthly magazine put him on their list of the 100 most powerful people. In 2004, he received the Outstanding Achievement award by the Sierra Club, the highest ranking award given to an employee. He has also received the Conservationist of the Year award from the NJ Audubon Society and recognition from Monmouth Friends of Clearwater.

Joseph Vicari, Ocean County Freeholder and Superintendent of Berkeley Township Schools

A staunch advocate for consumers, seniors, education, tourism, and the local business community, Freeholder Vicari was first elected to the Board of Freeholders in 1981 and has previously served as Director in 1987, 1990, 1993, 1996, 1999, 2002 and 2005. A Toms River Township Committeeman from 1980 to 1994, Freeholder Vicari served as mayor of the state's tenth largest community five times. After graduating St. Peter's College, Jersey City, he earned his M.A. in education, graduating Magna Cum Laude from Fairleigh Dickinson University. He is currently the Superintendent of Schools for Berkeley Township and serves as Chairman of the Ocean County Office of Senior Services and liaison to the Ocean County Library system.

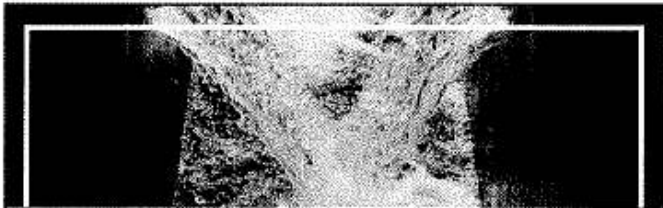

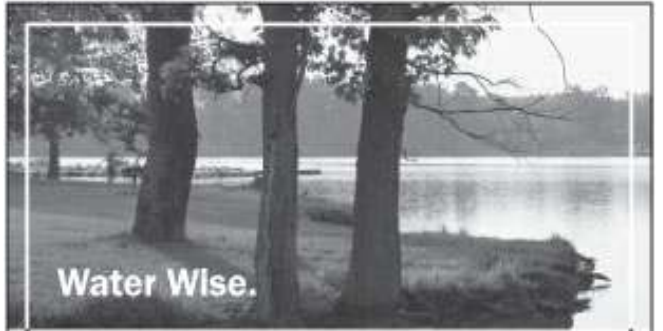
